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End Of Life Ethics And The AMA Code of Medical Ethics offers guidance that strongly encourages end-of-life planning and advance directives. The Code defines the physician's role and recognizes the fundamental tenet of patient autonomy, including the patient's right to modify a decision. The guidance addresses major issues in end-of-life care and includes support for patient decisions to withhold or withdraw life-sustaining intervention, and orders not to attempt resuscitation.
